Dear Friends

I am so happy that Spring is here. It comes around every year, so it is not as if we have not had spring before. And still, I am always glad when it arrives. This winter was strange. There were so many big storms, while in between we often had relatively mild weather. I saw some photos of the outer harbor area in Buffalo that showed the devastation from the wind and snow. A whole woodland has been leveled. As one person I was talking with said, it will grow back. The trees may take awhile and we may not see the return of the old habitat for many years, but it will regenerate.

We have moved into a season in which storms seems to be happening with more frequency and in areas that used to be immune to crazy weather. As the earth continues to grow warmer the effects are felt in different ways around the world. April is the month in which we celebrate the environment with Earth Day on the 22nd. Here is a little background.

The seeds that grew into the first Earth Day were planted by Wisconsin Senator [Gaylord Nelson](#). An ardent conservationist and former two-term governor of Wisconsin, Nelson had long sought ways to increase the potency of the environment as a political issue. The extraordinary attention garnered by [Rachel Carson](#)'s book, *Silent Spring*, the famous [1968 Earthrise NASA photograph](#) of the earth from the moon, the saturation news coverage given to the Santa Barbara oil spill<sup>[18]</sup> and the Cuyahoga River catching fire in early 1969<sup>[19]</sup> led Nelson to think the time was ripe for an environmental initiative. As a result of interactions with his staff and with [Fred Dutton](#),<sup>[20]</sup> a prominent Democratic operative who had been Robert Kennedy's presidential campaign manager, Nelson became convinced that environmental [teach-ins](#) on college campuses could serve as such a vehicle.

Earth Day has grown into a worldwide movement that calls us to consider the changes we need to make to protect and preserve this creation God has entrusted to our care. While it is true that the individual changes we make are like a drop of water into the ocean, they are still important. Change is change. As we consider how we can best protect this precious gift of the creation for our children and grandchildren, we can support legislation that requires more efficient vehicle emissions, the requires companies the clean up the messes they make, reduce the use of plastics in packaging, encourages the use of renewable energy. The list goes on and on. It can be overwhelming and a cause for us to get stuck and do nothing.

Psalm 8 reminds us of God's goodness and connection to creation.

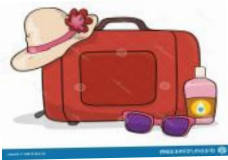

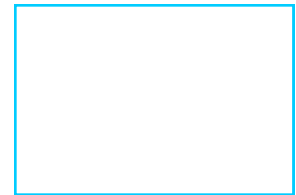
